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Detailed Definition of a Disciple

As a church you are committed to making disciples of Christ Jesus in obedience to His Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20). But what is a disciple of Jesus Christ? A disciple is a believer who is in the process of becoming more like Christ: displaying His character, daily living out His values and disciplines, answering Christ's call to a life of service to others. This is a basic definition of a disciple but growing as a follower of Jesus is also a process. Each book in this small group series is based on a Detailed Definition of a Disciple that provides a sequential outline of the disciple's growth process and the transformational indicators from the four phases of Jesus' ministry described in the Gospels. The following is a general description of the growth phase covered in this second of four books in this discipling small group series:



LOVING ONE ANOTHER: Deepening Spiritual Growth in the context of close relationships.

COME AND SEE – Level 2 Growing Believers in Vital Fellowship

General description: A disciple who has completed this phase has connected in vital relationship with other Christians in the context of a small group and other fellowship opportunities beyond public worship. They have gained assurance of salvation and a basic understanding of the Bible and foundational beliefs of Christianity.

Major Intent: To assist in connecting in the fellowship of the local church and teach basic truths of the faith.

- Teach basic beliefs and priorities.
- Nurture continued spiritual growth.
- Commitment to fellowship in the Body of Christ
- Encourage enough commitment to be a living witness for Christ.
- Invites others to church or outreach opportunities.

Duration: 4 - 24 months or longer, depending on the point from which the person begins.

Disciple's Involvement:

- Asks questions, seeking truth.
- Observes with limited responsibility.
- Connects in vital fellowship with other believers
- Serves, but does not lead.

Commitment: Moves from a personal commitment to Jesus Christ and the unity experienced in public worship to connecting with other Christ followers in vital fellowship and the intimacy of a small group.

Distinctives: A disciple who has completed this phase:

- Has the assurance of salvation
- Understands basic Christian doctrine
- Has a hunger to continue to learn and grow in God's Word
- Is beginning to exhibit basic Christian behaviors
- Has connected in vital relationship with fellow believers by participating in a mid-sized and a small group.



Transformational Indicators: By the end of this phase a disciple...

1. Rejoices in and learns about his/her new life in Christ by joining with other believers (the Body of Christ). Hebrews 10:24-25
2. Experiences assurance of salvation, a change in self-perception and identity as a beloved child of God, as he/she comes to know the glorious new life of power and joy prepared for him/her in Christ. 2 Corinthians 5:17
3. Is introduced to the person of the Holy Spirit. Ephesians 1:13
4. Desires to learn and grow in God's Word—the Bible. 2 Timothy 3:16-17
5. Establishes the foundational beliefs of the Christian faith. 1 Peter 2:2-3
6. Experiences a sincere yearning and love for God and is eager to share and express this love. 1 John 4:19



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Home Groups (Level 2) - Small Group Lesson Format

Note to Leaders: You may use the following small group discussion series in any order that you choose. You may skip any that do not fit your group or purpose. Some groups or individuals may have the spiritual hunger and commitment to advance more quickly to “Follow Me” Level 3 Accountability Small Group. That is fine. Be flexible and ready to help your members grow.

Home Groups

Level 2 - Small Group Lesson Format

Use this basic format for leading a “Come and See” level 2 “Covenant” small groups.

CONNECTING

1. Welcome and opening prayer.
2. Introduce any guests.
3. Share about what has happened throughout the previous week.

SEEKING GOD (Drawing Near to God) **(Note: you may choose to have the prayer time follow the Bible discussion, sharing Christ or Serving section)**



1. Conversational prayer is a very effective way to pray in a small group. It is a prayer that unites people in conversation with God and with each other. Like normal conversations, anyone can speak (pray) as many times as they wish and several people will often pray in agreement for the same request. ***Begin your time by praising God for who He is and what He has done.*

LOVING ONE ANOTHER (Deepening Spiritual Growth)

SHARING CHRIST (Declaring the Good News)

7. Discuss how Jesus makes it happen.
8. In what ways did Jesus have influence?
9. In contrast to leaders today that come and go on the scene of history. Jesus lasted because He had integrity. How important is it to have integrity?
10. What was unusual about Jesus teaching and modeling that leadership meant being a servant? How does this contrast to our world in the way that people do things today? (*Mark 10:45*)

Assurance Of Forgiveness

6. Read *Romans 12:2*. To what is Paul referring when he writes, “the pattern of this world”? What would that mean today in our world? What are some of the results of allowing the world to squeeze us into its mold?
7. What does it mean to renew our mind and how are we to do it?
8. How does spending time daily in prayer and in praise throughout the day renew one’s mind? Share a personal experience.

THE HOLY SPIRIT



How To Be Filled With The Holy Spirit

1. Read *Acts 1:8*. What is it that every Christian needs in order for their witness for Christ to be effective?

3. Talk about some of the things which damage a Christian's witness, whenever the Holy Spirit is not in control of a life.
 - a. **Instability** Read *James 1:6-8*. How does doubt affect our prayer life?
 - b. **Lacking in love**. Talk about how the Holy Spirit gives us power to love when confronted by hate. (*Romans 5:5*)
 - c. **Being overcome and defeated by sin**. Talk about how there is power in sin, but there is greater power in us through the Holy Spirit. Read *Acts 15:7-8*, and see what the Holy Spirit wants to do within us.
 - d. **Refusing to be a team player**. Read *Ephesians 5:17-21*. In verse 21, what is the result of being filled with the Holy Spirit as we relate to each other?
 - e. **Thought question**: What difference does being filled with the Holy Spirit make in our relationship with our family and fellow Christians?
4. In *Ephesians 5:8*. We are commanded to do what?
 - a. According to this verse, who is to be in control of our lives?
 - b. What or who is in control of your life right now?

FIVE STEPS TO BEING FILLED WITH THE HOLY SPIRIT

1. First read *Matthew 5:6*. State the promise. Read *John 7:37-39*. What did Jesus promise would happen when the Holy Spirit was given and would live within us?
2. **Confession and Repentance**

Jesus Lives! The Patterns Of The Resurrection Life

1. If you were a ghost, who would you visit? Why?
2. Look at *Luke 24:36-43*. What was the Apostles' first impression upon seeing Jesus?
 - a. What did they think He was?
 - b. Jesus went to great lengths to show them that He did have a physical body. What kinds of things did He demonstrate to them as proof of His physical existence? (*Luke 24:41-43*)
 - c. It is obvious that Jesus was not satisfied with the fact that they perceived Him as a spirit. They needed to understand Him as having a physical body. Look at *1 Thessalonians 5:22* From Paul's blessing in this verse, what do you discover about human nature?
3. We know a lot about the Resurrection body and its nature from Jesus and His personal experiences. The nature of these bodies seems to be wonderfully complex, as we look at Jesus in this section of Scripture in Luke. We see that He is able to appear and disappear at will, which would indicate qualities of the spirit. He is also able to be felt, handled, and touched. He is also able to eat, it seems that He specifically asked for some fish to demonstrate this fact. So it looks like the resurrection body has the best of both worlds, the spiritual and the physical. Now turn to *1 Corinthians 15:35-50*. Paul is answering a question put to him by some of the people in the Corinthian Church about the nature of the resurrection body and how the dead will be raised.
 - a. In what ways does Paul compare the resurrection to the sowing of seed and reaping of harvest? (*1 Corinthians 15:36-37*)
 - b. Paul is absolutely clear about the source of this marvelous miracle. What is it?
 - c. Not only is the body physical and spiritual, but also it is something else that is very, very important. We see that this body is imperishable and eternal. How does this differ from our present condition in our physical bodies?
 - d. It seems that our Heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, finally undoes the harm that Adam did, by bringing sin and death into the world. Through Adam came death, but through Jesus Christ comes life everlasting and a new resurrection body. This resurrection power in principle, not only applies to our physical existence, but also it helps us to cope with the day-to-day disappointments, situations, failures and brokenness of life. Look up *John 10:10*, and the promise of Jesus to bring us abundant life. How does this cross-reference with our study of resurrection power?
4. Share a personal experience of your own that demonstrates the resurrection power of Jesus Christ at work in your life, overcoming the disastrous effects of sin, death and brokenness?
 - a. How has your experience in our group helped you to realize and receive more and more of Jesus' resurrection power into your own life?
 - b. How can you help hurting people find the resurrection power of Jesus Christ for their own lives?

5. What is your definition of a **miracle**?
6. Read *John 20:10-18*. How would you describe Mary's grief?
7. What does this paragraph say about her love for Jesus?
8. Compare Mary at the beginning of this reading with the Mary at the conclusion. What has caused the change?
9. When has Jesus met you at your point of need as He did with Mary?
10. What did you learn in that experience about God's care for us?
11. Examine *John 20:17* again. What is the strong message there for us today?
12. With whom will you share the good news from *John 20:18* this next week? "I have seen the Lord."
